In May 2025, India and Venezuela advanced several commercially significant initiatives aimed at deepening bilateral trade, investment, and sectoral cooperation. On May 7, Venezuela's Minister of Foreign Trade, Coromoto Godoy, held high-level discussions in Caracas with India's Ambassador Ashok Babu and Bancoex President Guillermo Lara. The meeting focused on strengthening institutional frameworks to support trade in pharmaceuticals, digital services, and logistics, while also exploring the creation of a multilateral trade system to facilitate broader regional integration.

Building on the Memorandum of Understanding signed earlier in the year, both countries reaffirmed their commitment to digital transformation as a pillar of cooperation. India offered technical expertise and scalable platforms in healthcare, education, and e-governance, positioning the partnership as a model for South–South collaboration in digital public infrastructure. Venezuelan officials expressed strong interest in India's successful implementation of population-scale digital solutions and emphasized the potential for adaptation in local governance and service delivery.

Sectoral outreach continued through follow-up engagements with Indian industry bodies such as FICCI and NOIDA SEZ. Venezuelan authorities revisited proposals for joint ventures in pharmaceuticals and agro-processing, and expressed interest in replicating elements of India's Gati Shakti logistics framework and SEZ integration models in Bolivar and Zulia states. These discussions underscored the importance of addressing logistics bottlenecks and enhancing supply chain resilience through targeted infrastructure development.

India's broader logistics modernization efforts, highlighted in international editorials such as the Drishti IAS analysis, were cited by Venezuelan think tanks as benchmarks for improving port-led industrial zones and multimodal connectivity. Venezuela is currently exploring the deployment of Al-powered customs systems and sector-specific logistics parks, drawing inspiration from India's experience in harmonizing trade facilitation with industrial growth.

Trade between the two countries remains robust, with India exporting pharmaceuticals, machinery, electrical equipment, apparel, and chemical products, while Venezuela supplies crude oil, mineral fuels, iron, steel, aluminum, and select agricultural commodities. Both governments have reiterated their commitment to diversifying the trade relationship beyond hydrocarbons. India's External Affairs Minister emphasized Venezuela's strategic role in Latin America, while Venezuelan officials praised India's non-interventionist approach and its technology-driven development model.

- 1. **U.S. Sanctions Impact:** India halted crude oil imports from Venezuela after the U.S. imposed a 25% tariff on countries buying Venezuelan oil, disrupting a major energy channel.
- 2. **Energy Diversification:** India began sourcing oil from alternative partners in Africa and the Middle East to offset the loss of Venezuelan supply.
- **3. Venezuelan Response:** Venezuela condemned the sanctions and sought deeper trade ties with India through non-dollar mechanisms and strategic outreach.
- 4. **Political Instability:** Venezuela's pre-election environment saw repression of opposition figures, raising concerns about investment risks and operational continuity.
- 5. **Multilateral Cooperation:** Both countries reaffirmed their commitment to South–South collaboration and diplomatic engagement despite external pressures.
- 6. **Digital Partnership**: India and Venezuela advanced cooperation in digital infrastructure, focusing on scalable solutions in health, education, and governance.
- 7. Sectoral Risk Awareness: Indian stakeholders were advised to monitor regulatory shifts, payment risks, and logistics disruptions linked to Venezuela's internal and external challenges.
